Frontotemporal dementia is an umbrella term for a group of uncommon brain disorders that primarily affect the frontal and temporal lobes of the brain. These areas of the brain are generally associated with personality, behavior and language. In frontotemporal dementia, portions of these lobes shrink (atrophy).

Different types. Dementia is a term used to describe severe changes in the brain that cause memory loss. These changes also make it difficult for people to perform basic daily activities.

The brain volumes were corrected for age, gender and head size. The total behavioral symptom score of the five symptoms of interest was negatively associated with the volume of the subcallosal area ($\beta = -0.32$, $p = 0.002$). High disinhibition scores were associated with reduced volume in the gyrus rectus ($\beta = -0.30$, $p = 0.002$), medial frontal cortex ($\beta = -0.30$, $p = 0.002$), superior frontal gyrus ($\beta = -0.28$, $p = 0.003$), inferior frontal gyrus ($\beta = -0.28$, $p = 0.005$) and subcallosal area ($\beta = -0.28$, $p = 0.005$).

Aberrant motor behavior was associated with atrophy of frontal pole ($\beta = -0.29$, $p = 0.005$) and the subcallosal area ($\beta = -0.39$, $p < 0.001$). No significant associations with frontal brain volumes were found for agitation and irritability.

Understanding Behavioral Changes in Dementia
